

THE OFFICE OF SPONSORED RESEARCH & PROGRAMS ACTIVITY REPORT – FISCAL YEAR 2014 THROUGH DECEMBER

The University faculty, staff and students are involved in research, education and service projects through the support of governmental, business and philanthropic entities. This report summarizes key aspects of this activity and highlights awards received in FY 2014 through the month of December.

RESULTS

As of the end of December, the University has submitted 167 proposals for support of University-based projects. To date, 144 awards have been received – some of which are from proposals submitted during the previous fiscal year. The commitment of funds in these grants and contracts to date is \$13.3 million. It should be noted that some of these awards are for projects that extend over more than one year, but the formal commitment for funds is only for the current project year.





PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

- **Dr. Alicia Mathis,** biology department head at Missouri State University, received a renewal grant for \$45,917 from the **National Park Services (NPS) via the Great Rivers Cooperative Ecosystem Studies Unit (NPS)** for the National Park Services Vital Signs Monitoring program. The purpose of this program is to engage university faculty and students in research for the benefit of NPS park natural resources. In addition to data collected, the program also benefits participants by providing educational and professional opportunities to students in the field of natural resources management.
- **Dr. Arbindra Rimal,** professor of agriculture at Missouri State University, received a grant in the amount of \$569,890 through the USDA's National Institute of Food and Agriculture for the project "Food Security Through Linking Resources to Enhance Undergraduate Education: Strategic Partnership Among Five Universities in Missouri." The grant money will be used to enhance online course development, offer mini-grants to undergraduate research projects and offer mini-courses at local community colleges.
- **Dr. Chin-Feng Hwang,** associate professor in the William H. Darr School of Agriculture, was awarded \$146,856 from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) for the Non-Land Grant Colleges of Agriculture program (NLGCA). The project is entitled "Expanding Research and Education Capacities on Next-Generation Molecular Marker for Grape Cultivar Improvement." The goal of this project is to expand our partnership with the Cornell University-based VitisGen program and to promote the usage of the existing network of grape genotyping platforms, marker-based breeding strategies and an integrated plant breeding education resource.
- **Dorothy Wittorff-Sandgren**, community development coordinator, Center for Resource Planning and Management and **Diane May**, assistant professor of geography, geology and planning and director of Center for Resource Planning and Management were awarded a renewal grant of \$303,345 from the **Department of Homeland Security via the Missouri Office of Homeland Security** for the Region D FY13 Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP).
