Speaker Biography:

Jeremy Chesman is Professor of Music and University Carillonist at Missouri State. He

has performed throughout the United States, Europe, and Australia. Through his music

performances, he's had audiences with the US ambassador to Portugal, Lyudmila Ocheretnaya

(former first lady of Russia), Queen Sonja of Norway, Queen Fabiola of Belgium, and countless

drag queens.

At the start of his career, Jeremy's primary research activity was performance. His

interest in communicating his performance ideas to students led him to begin researching music

teaching and learning. This led to the publication of pedagogical recordings, textbooks, and

articles, as well as invitations to teach children in the US, Sweden, and Australia as well as to

present masterclasses at the University of Michigan and Yale University. Building on previous

research, he is participating in research projects related to the human voice as well as to music

cognition.

Abstract of Talk:

How does an artist go about learning a piece of music? This lecture-recital explores this concept, as harpist Jeremy Chesman explains the technical and artistic decision-making process he used as a way to create meaning in Sergiu Natra's *A Book of Hebrew Songs* (1973).

Interdisciplinarity:

This presentation will help communicate the value of performance as research and will help to educate colleagues in the college about research that may look very different from theirs. This will be beneficial knowledge for anyone serving on a college committee. Furthermore, it will combine information from the fields of neuroscience, languages and culture, literature, and, of course, music to demonstrate how information from a variety of disciplines can strengthen one's work.
