Since the overthrow of Saddam Hussein's regime in 2003, new authorities in Baghdad's federal government and the Kurdistan Region's Government have been embroiled in a number of disputes. These include territories disputed between the two, authority over oil and gas, budget issues and the right of the Kurdistan Region to secede under certain circumstances. Join two preeminent experts on these issues as they debate how these disputes can be resolved within the framework of Iraq's 2005 constitution.



Feisal al-Istrabadi is Iraq's former ambassador to the United Nations, a former trial lawyer in the United States with experience in civil rights, employment discrimination, and constitutional torts, Founding Director of the Indiana University Center for the Study of the Middle East, author of numerous works on the Middle East, and served as principal legal drafter of the Iraqi interim constitution.



Brendan O'Leary is the Lauder Professor of Political Science at the University of Pennsylvania, winner of the inaugural Juan Linz Prize of the International Political Science Association, author of numerous works on power-sharing, a former Senior Advisor on Power-sharing in the Standby Team of the United Nations, and served as an advisor to the Kurdistan Regional Government during the drafting of the interim Iraqi constitution and the final 2005 Iraqi constitution.



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
