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SEPTEMBER IN THE IA

September brings training opportunities for Internship Academy participants. All TiRs, Master Teachers, and interns have participated in co-teaching training. TiRs and Master Teachers also participate in training on the MEES (Missouri Educator Evaluation System).

In their classrooms, interns are co-teaching with their Master Teachers daily. Many are teaching small groups, teaching whole group lessons, engaging students in read alouds, and performing recess and dismissal duties. Some interns are also working in after school programs or tutoring students for a stipend.

Interns are busy planning Integrated Units. The Internship Academy gives interns the opportunity to plan this unit with the specific needs of their students in mind. They also teach it to their class, allowing for the opportunity to intentionally differentiate their lesson plans, analyze formative assessment data, and adjust their instruction as needed. Interns reflect not only on the planning process but also on the instruction of the lesson. This is a key learning experience for interns this year.

The Program Coordinators and Regional Supervisor have visited every classroom in the IA, checking in on the start of the year. Interns are off to a great start!

Key Players in the Internship Academy

Teachers in Residence

The Teacher in Residence, or TiR, is a classroom teacher who serves as a supervisor for all interns placed in a building. TiRs are teachers in the placement district and also represent Missouri State. They attend monthly stakeholder meetings with district representatives and MSU faculty. TiRs are critical to the decision-making process of the IA. TiRs also guide interns through regular reflections, provide feedback to interns, support interns through the development of their Integrated Unit Plan, and observe the interns in their classrooms.

Master Teachers

Master Teachers are similar to Cooperating Teachers in the traditional student teaching program. Master Teachers host interns in their classrooms for the school year. They model research-based instructional practices, good classroom management, effective parent communication, and all other aspects of teaching. They coach interns as they grow as educators. Master Teachers observe interns teach and provide feedback regularly. Master Teachers are great communicators who take the time to explain the "why" behind what happens in the classroom.

Dr. John Shaughnessy is a retired educator from the St. Louis region. He started his teaching career in elementary school followed by middle school in the Kirkwood School District, and continued teaching middle school in the Ladue School District.
