"Serial Murder:

Its Myth and Investigation"

Steven Egger, Ph.D.



Dr. Egger is one of the world's foremost experts on serial killers. He is a former homicide investigator. John Wavne Gacy and Henry Lee Lucas are amongst the infamous serial killers Dr. Egger has had opportunities to personally interview. Drawing on his extensive experience and research, Dr. Egger has authored several books, including The Need to Kill: Inside the World of the Serial Killer and Killers Among Us: Examination of Serial Murder and Its Investigations and compiled data on over 1300 serial killers. He served as the project director for the State of New York's computerized tracking system for serial murders. Dr. Egger coined the terms "less dead" and "linkage blindness." He has and continues to train and work with the FBI and law enforcement with regards to the crimes of serial rape and killing. Dr. Egger is currently an Associate Professor at the University of Houston at Clear Lake.


