We have begun to develop a sustainable financial plan and will initiate a new direction in the coming year.

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The Board of Governors had its annual retreat last week. The main discussion topic for the first part of the retreat was the university's financial model.

Our 2016-21 Long-Range Plan stated "emong the most influential changes affecting higher education is the decreasing support at the state level." In the last six months, Missouri State has sustained three significant reductions in state for the state of the state of

- FY17 withholding of approximately \$6.7 million
- FY18 budget reduction of \$6.5 million
- . FY18 withholding of approximately \$2.7 million

This is a pattern we expect to continue for the foreseeable future

How should the university move forward to develop a sustainable financial model in this era of declining state support? We will continue to make the case for additional state funding, but Miscount State can no longer rely solely on state funding to support its goals. Accordingly, with the complete support of the Board of Governors, we have begun to develop a clan and will linkite a new discriction in the comino variety.








- 12 faculty participated

Improve English language teaching in the Ozarks

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND LETTERS

- 85 pre-K through 12th grade teachers learned how to help those of another first language.
- Teachers gain Missouri ELL (English Language Learner) endorsement plus an MSU graduate certificate.

- Project components include online classes, observation and community-engagement.



College of Education highlights


- Internship Academy
 - Yearlong in-school experience for 25 elementary education students
 - Now expanded to other teaching areas
 - Viewed as a success model for the state

- One Missouri Project
 - Recruitment and economic development initiative partnering with urban schools
 - Students merge theory with practice in their own communities
- Bear POWER
 - Will service 17-26 individuals with intellectual disabilities



Collaboration across CHHS programs

- New teaching and research balance assessment and rehabilitation equipment
- Used by physical therapy, audiology, occupational therapy and athletic training
- Purchased by pooling resources from departments, college and provost

- Service-learning vision screening program introduced this fall














FY 2017 degrees and certificates awarded

BACKGROUND

- MSU's 125-hour requirement is the highest of state schools.
- 78% of MSU programs currently fit within 120 credits.
- No programs would be required to change.

Focus on summer school structure

QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER

- How to best utilize the summer period?
- Would more flexibility meet student and program needs?
- Could new options increase enrollment?



Impact success

HIGH SCHOOL TO COLLEGE

- Continue Jump Start summer preparation (more than 50 students)
- New transition program not required but suggested
 - Peer mentoring
 - Monthly meetings on success strategies
- Raise admission criteria



Promoting student retention

- Academic success center to help transition students into college
- 28 GEP 101 sections for first-generation and college focus
- Pre-register students for all GEP 101 sections
- Use of a Blackboard course outline still allowing faculty flexibility
- Work toward a second year action-based experience study away, service-learning, etc.



Reduction of remedial classes

English

- Spring 2017: ENG 100 linked concurrently with ENG 110
- Current semester: several sections with this corequisite model

Math

- Current pilot program: MTH 130 with a corequisite one credit hour
- Spring schedule: MTH 103 block sequenced with MTH 135
- Advising to select the "best" math class for the major



Introduce structured schedules

- Concept and action place students in specific courses.
- Goal: Provide students more guidance to enhance completion.
- MSU will pilot this process for first-year students in fall 2018.
 - GEP 101 section assigned
 - Pre-business students registered for three courses
 - Placement of pre-nursing students in required courses
 - Musical theatre majors



Advisement initiatives

- Student educational planner
 - Four-year focus with plans updated for major
 - More use in GEP 101; select the "best" math pathway for the major


- Exploratory majors
