Stephen Black, JD, Plenary Speaker

Mr. Black is founder and director for the Center for Ethics & Social Responsibility, University of Alabama as well as the statewide organization called Impact Alabama. Impact is a national nonprofit that offers opportunities for college students to participate in structured service projects designed to promote learning and leadership development. For his work with FocusFirst, Black received the prestigious Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Community Health Leaders Award which is given to those who demonstrate creativity and commitment in addressing society's most pressing health issues.



Dr. Nancy Cantor, Plenary Speaker

Nancy Cantor is Chancellor of Rutgers University – Newark, a post she assumed in January 2014. A distinguished leader in higher education, she is recognized nationally and internationally as an advocate for reemphasizing its public mission. Prior to her current position, Cantor was Chancellor and President of Syracuse University. Her efforts at Syracuse earned Chancellor Cantor the 2008 Carnegie Corporation Academic Leadership Award. They also earned Syracuse the distinction of being among the first institutions to earn the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching's classification as a university committed to Community Engagement.
