Student Success in the Creative Writing Department

In fall of 2011, hundreds of students in Creative Writing classes (both in General Education classes and in the Creative major or minor) at Missouri State began working with students in the After School Program at the three Boys and Girls Clubs of Springfield, and this program has continued every semester since then. At MSU, there are up to 600 Creative Writing students in any fall or spring semester, from the sophomore level to the graduate level. A great deal of planning went into developing materials to help engage the Boys and Girls Club students in creative writing projects that were meaningful to them. The project was meant to inspire, motivate, and teach both the Missouri State students and their younger counterparts at the Boys and Girls Clubs. The main thrust of the program is to try to create a break-through for a young student to love writing and to create a passion for learning and creativity that will continue for a lifetime.
